Activities during the year: In past years, we noted that annual meeting attendance by federal, state, and county agency personnel has declined. To try to understand this trend, we created a survey to query agency personnel who have weed management responsibilities. I sent the survey to agency personnel in the fall of 2025, with the help of WSWS contacts as well as working groups such as the Western Weeds Coordinating Committee and FICMNEW. The response rate to the survey was very low, with only 12 responses. Nonetheless, I think the responses, summarized below, are valuable.

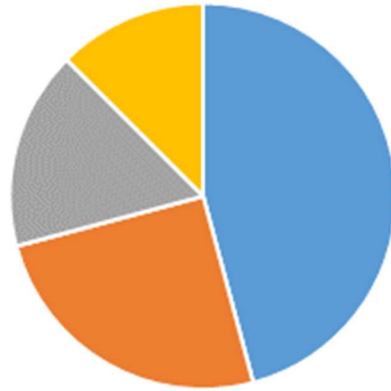
8. How might the Western Society for Weed Science increase relevance for you?

9. Do you have any other feedback about the WSWS annual meeting from your perspective as a Federal, State, or County agency member of WSWS?

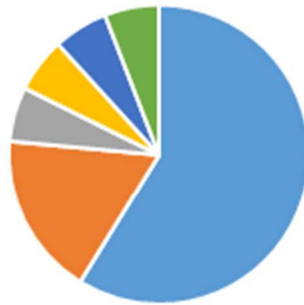
Facilitated discussions (such as ESA labelling last year) are great. Have more of those.

Meetings attended other the WSWS



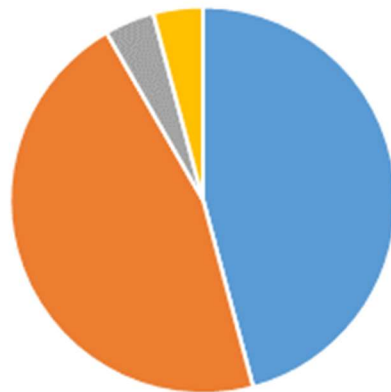
