## **Activities during the year:**


The Legislative Committee met on July 22<sup>nd</sup> via Zoom. The meeting was attended by Rachel Zuger; John Vickery; and Alan Helm. The committee reviewed committee expectations as defined under the Constitution and By-laws. The committee also reviewed the current contact list for state and province weed program coordinators in the west. The contact list was uploaded to Google Documents and the link was sent out for state coordinators to update their contact information as necessary. The link to the Google document is:

Plans were also made to distribute an informational survey to state and province program coordinators to identify localized, national and regional legislative issues the WSWS should be aware of. The survey questions included the following:

- 1. Has there been any changes to the state/provincial weed list/or seed list in the past two years?
- 2. Is there weed management issues that are becoming more problematic within your program that WSWS membership should be aware of?
  - a. Is there any local or national legislative/policy changes needed to address these issues?
- 3. Is there any assistance WSWS membership can provide you in dealing with these issues?
- 4. Has your program's capacity of implementing weed management programs been improved or compromised the past two years?
- 5. Are you pursuing "Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act" (IIJA) funding for invasive weed projects?
- 6. Is there any feedback, additional information, or topics not covered under this survey you would like WSWS and the Legislative committee to be aware of?

The survey was published on Google Forms and distributed to the contact list in August, 2022. All responses were recorded within that same month. The below map indicates the states and provinces with the WSWS area (Bylaws – Section 1) that participated in the survey. Additionally, one state and one province not identified within the WSWS membership area also participated in the survey:



## **Recommendations for Board Action:**

The aggregate responses are included within this report. However, several topics of interest for the WSWS to track and follow are below:


- The need for help in addressing interstate commerce for sale of plants that are banned in one state but not in a neighboring state. (Minnesota)
- Work with EPA on science based labeling and coordinated risk assessments between federal agencies. (Wyoming)
- Shortages of herbicides such as glyphosate, glufosinate and MCPA have forced producers to seed out other options for weed control in 2022. Additionally, prices on herbicides has skyrocketed. (Saskatchewan, Wyoming)

Additionally, problematic weed management issues that were identified were:

- The need for a "buyback" program for nursery industry plants that are identified as weeds or potential weeds. (Minnesota)
- Lack of state (Utah) response for aquatic weed species. (Utah)
- Lack of management by railroads and absentee landowners. (Kansas, Montana)
- Public perception of aerial applications of pesticides. (Wyoming)
- Herbicide resistant kochia. (Saskatchewan)
- Glyphosate resistant kochia and downy brome (cheatgrass). (Alberta)



Has there been any changes to the state/provincial weed list and/or seed list in the past two years? 14 responses




Has your program's capacity for implementing weed management programs been improved or compromised the past two years? Impacts on ca...costs or other economic or labor related factors.
