# **President's Message**

The Board held the summer meeting August 1 & 2 in Colorado Springs at the Doubletree Inn. As many of you may remember, the WSWS meeting was held at the Doubletree 5 years ago. It is an ideal site with plenty of meeting space. The banquet representative has a record of how the last meeting was organized and they are very well prepared to help us put on the 2004 meeting. Phil Stahlman, Scott Nissen and Mike Edwards are busy working on the upcoming program and agenda.

I would like to thank all members of the board who were able to make the meeting and for the reports submitted by all of the committees. It made the Board's work a lot easier.

Special thanks for the efforts of the Finance committee in working out a number of issues for the organization. As required by the IRS, Wanda will become an employee of WSWS and she will receive a salary that keeps her take home pay unchanged. Our financial investments are on the upswing

with the recovering economy. For a number of years, Stanley Cooper of Merrill Lynch has been doing an excellent job of managing the WSWS portfolio. He has moved to RBC Dain Rauscher and the Board, on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, voted to move the portfolio with Stanley Cooper. There were several financial benefits for WSWS. The Finance Committee also recommended to the Board that the fees for the 2004 meeting be raised. The Board voted to increase the annual meeting registration fee from \$75 to \$95; spouse from \$25 to \$30; student fees from \$0 to \$25; and annual membership fee from \$15 to \$25. The need for the increase is because of higher meeting expenses including meals. WSWS fees are still less than those charged by NCWSS and SWSS.

A committee chaired by Steve Miller and consisting of Jill Schroeder and Roland Schirman will review and update the operations guide for each committee. I would like all committee chairs to review the operations guide and send any suggestions or recommendations to any committee member.

There are a lot of changes coming to the web site. We have a new webmaster and there will be a number of upgrades. It should be online soon. Because of the increasing importance of the website to the WSWS membership, a temporary three member committee will be working to keep the web updated and add improvements. Joan Campbell, Neal Hageman and Tony White will be the initial members. There is too much work for one individual to do and it is important to have backup personnel. It is important to the WSWS to develop ideas on where we are going and what we want to be in the future. There will be a workshop at the 2004 meeting to start this process. All members are urged to think about what you want WSWS to be and to give suggestions to any board member or be a part of the discussion next March.

The 2006 meeting will be at the Nugget in Reno.

All is moving ahead for the 2004 meeting.

# **IPINAMS** Conference registration

Registration is now open for the Invasive Plants in Natural and Managed Systems: Linking Science and Management (IPINAMS) Conference. This conference was initiated by WSSA and is being cosponsored by the Weed Science Society of America and the Ecological Society of America in conjunction with 7th International Conference on the Ecology and Management of Alien Plant Invasions.

The Preliminary Program and Registration materials for the IPINAMS conference which will be held November 3-7, 2003 at the Wyndham Bonaventure Resort, Ft. Lauderdale, FL are available on the conference website at www.esa.org/ipinamsemapi7/.

The goals of the conference are to enhance dialogue between scientists, managers, and practitioners in order to broaden our understanding of the science, needs, and prospects for efficient management of nonnative plant invasions and to foster interdisciplinary cooperation on the science and management of invasive exotic plants. The conference will bring together ecologists, weed scientists, private and public land managers, agricultural scientists, botanists, weed management specialists, extension personnel, economists, agriculture and natural resource educators, policy makers, horticultural and nursery professionals, biological control investigators and practitioners, and others interested in invasive species issues.

The conference will feature three and a half days of plenary sessions, symposia, workshops, contributed poster and oral presentations, and roundtable discussions, as well as pre- and post-conference field trips. An extensive poster session with contributed posters will focus on conference themes and offer an excellent opportunity for extended and informal discussion.

# International Weed Science Society Announces Graduate Student Travel Award Opportunity

The IWSS has decided to encourage the participation of young weed scientists (M.Sc. and Ph.D. students) in the upcoming IWSC-2004 in Durban, South Africa, by providing up to 6 scholarships that will cover registration fees, accommodation, and part of the travel expenses. The Graduate Student Award Committee (Prof J. Streibig, Chairman, Dr. Phil Banks and Prof. B. Rubin) will select the awardees according to the following criteria:

1. The candidate must be enrolled as a M.Sc. or Ph.D. student, pursuing a degree related to WEED SCIENCE as of December 20, 2003.

2. Submissions should be in the form of up to a 5 page manuscript including tables, figures and photos (PDF file - font 12, 1.5 space and 3 cm margin throughout), with abstract, introduction, materials and methods, results, and discussion. Deadline for submission is December 31, 2003.

3. Submissions will be appraised/judged based on the following merits: quality of research, novelty, contribution to the

discipline of Weed Science and to the society. The research is required be that of the student.

4. Submissions should include a letter of commitment from the major professor or institution to provide additional travel support if the student should receive the award from IWSS.
