Report from the President by Kai Umeda

The Annual Meeting of the WSWS in Reno at the Peppermill Resort was successful again because of the hard work by all of its volunteer members. Research efforts were described in the five Projects where there were 84 oral presentations and 79 posters. There were 18 papers and 15 posters (including 4 undergraduates) given by students in the paper/poster competitions. Joe Yenish, Research Section Chairman with Project Chairmen Chad Asmus, Lars Baker, Hank Mager, Bill McCloskey, and Gustavo Sbatella saw to it that the sessions were on-time and conducted stimulating discussions. Tim Prather, Education and Regulatory Section

Chairman conducted an informative session on communicating and measuring Impacts. An expansion of the Horticulture Crops Project featured a symposium on Tree and Vine Weed Control organized by Monica Sorribas and Rick Mann. Ian Burke, Cini Brown, and Jane Mangold organized and conducted an informative and well-attended symposium about the Ecology and Management of Downy Brome in the West. Trusty Charlie Hicks organized and had a packed room as usual for the "What's New in Industry" session. In the opening general session, Robert Norris gave perspectives about WSWS history and its geographic breadth, Bob Zimdahl offered a provocative Ethical Challenge, and the newest WSWS Fellow, Lars Anderson described a Lake Tahoe aquatic weed management collaboration for local flavor. Student Liaisons Mike Ostlie and Cameron Douglass worked diligently throughout the year to develop and implement new and improved activities for all students as well as organizing the popular Student Night Out. Tim Miller, Presidential Award of Merit recipient, completed 3 years of dedicated service as WSSA Representative and as he was described as an "octopus with tentacles everywhere", Tim was a troubleshooter prior to the general session. Dependable Phil Banks and his assistant Ed Morris ensured that all preparations and carrying out the logistics of the meetings proceeded without a hitch. I want to offer everyone a sincere thank you for making the program educational, meaningful, and successful.

As the details are wrapped up to close out the 64th Meeting, Member-at-Large Bob Stougaard and I look forward to continuing the efforts of Past-President Vanelle Peterson and past Member-at-Large Pete Forster to survey our membership and to determine fruitful ways to grow WSWS into the future.

A critical area where we seem to fall short is to effectively and broadly communicate what WSWS does and how good it is in doing all that it accomplishes. 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WSWS 2012 Fellow Awards by Celestine Duncan

Fellows of the Society are members who have given meritorious service in weed science, and who are elected by two-thirds majority of the Board of Directors. Jodi Holt and Lars Anderson were elected as Fellows of the WSWS for 2012.



Jodi Holt

Dr. Jodi Holt is a professor of plant physiology and the chair of the Department of Botany and Plant Sciences at University of California, Riverside. She has been a professor of plant physiology with research and teaching responsibility since 1982 at UC Riverside, and department chair since 2003. Her many contributions to Weed Science range from herbicide resistance research, to modeling temperature and moisture-based weed emergence and development, to studying the biology and management of invasive weed species. Jodi has been an active and important member of the Western Society of Weed Science and Weed Science Society of

America.

In the WSWS,

Through her career to date, Dr. Holt authored or co-authored over 36 technical refereed journal publications and eight book chapters including a co-authoring a well-respected book, Ecology of Weeds and Invasive Plants: Relationship to Agriculture and Natural Resource Management. She has also authored or co-authored over 55 semi-technical publication, special reports, and proceedings pertaining to invasive plant science issues. She made more than 69 presentations or posters as an invited speaker or contributor at the WSWS meeting and other weed science related professional meetings, and served on numerous committees in WSWS and WSSA. Dr. Holt also served as a consultant and expert on Pandora's vegetation in James Cameron's Avatar movie.

Dr. Holt has been a mentor to many graduate students over the years and has served as major professor for 16 graduate students. Several of these have been in collaboration with weed scientists at other universities in addition with faculty at UC Riverside.

Her numerous awards and recognitions include: Outstanding paper published in Weed Science (1992 and 2000); Fellow WSSA (2000), Fellow AAAS (2006), UC Riverside Distinguished Teaching award (2009), and WSSA Outstanding Research award (2010).



Lars Anderson

Dr. Lars Anderson retired in January 2012 from his position as lead scientist and director of the USDA Agricultural Research Service (ARS) Exotic and Invasive Weed Research Unit in Davis, California. Dr. Anderson received his Ph.D. from the University of California, Santa Barbara in 1974 and worked for 37 years on basic and applied research on the biology and management of invasive aquatic weeds. His work experience included two years with the US Environmental Protection Service and 35 years with the USDA-ARS. During his career he developed basic physiological and ecological information directly related to improving control and eradication of invasive aquatic plants with chemical and

non-chemical methods. In addition to his research program he also developed a strong outreach and education program.

In the WSWS,

Dr. Anderson has been an active member of the Western Society of Weed Science and California Invasive Plant Council, and served as president of the Western Aquatic Plant Management Society, Aquatic Plant Management Society, and the California Weed Science Society. During his career he published over 70 peer-reviewed publications and 35 peer-reviewed technical reports and popular articles. Dr. Anderson led an expansion of the WSWS Aquatic Section which eventually evolved to the Western Aquatic Plant Management Society in 1985, of which he was a co-founder. He has been actively involved in policy and political issues with regard to invasive aquatic species.

Dr. Anderson served as a graduate advisor for 12 students (both MS and Ph.D.). He is currently President of Board of Trustees for the Explicit Science Center.

Dr. Anderson has received numerous awards and recognitions including the USDA Unit Distinguished Service Award and the California Weed Science Society Award of Excellence.

Call for Symposia Titles for the 66th Annual Meeting of the WSWS

WSWS members are invited to submit proposals for symposia at the 66th Annual Meeting to be held at the Catamaran Resort Hotel in San Diego, CA on March 11-14, 2013. The WSWS program committee will receive proposals, and then evaluate all of the proposed symposia based on 1) how well they are justified, 2) the target audience, 3) the completeness of the agenda, and 4) detailed budget. The program committee together with the WSWS Board of Directors may approve full or half-day symposia for the annual meeting. An allowable budget of up to \$2000 can support travel expenses for invited nonmember speakers. Include estimated travel and lodging costs for invited speakers (no honoraria will be paid to symposium participants) plus any other anticipated expenses (food & beverages, etc.) in the budget. Although funds have been budgeted for the symposia, the goal is to spend the least amount necessary to obtain excellent symposia speakers. The Catamaran Resort Hotel room rates in San Diego will be \$147 plus tax. Please use the WSWS ANNUAL MEETING SYMPOSIUM PROPOSAL FORM (see below). Symposium proposals can be e-mailed directly to Roger Gast (regast@dow.com) and are due June 15, 2012. Proposals for future meetings beyond the 2013 San Diego meeting are encouraged.

Recent past symposia topics have included Tree & Vine Weed Control, Ecology and Management of Downy brome, Ventenata dubia, ecological effects of invasive plants, Kochia, invasive grasses, jointed goatgrass, biological control of invasive plants, adjuvant technology, Arundo/Phragmites, application technology, knotweed, crop protection chemistry vs. genetically modified crops, dose response functions, and salt cedar. Topics that are relevant for a local audience are encouraged so that WSWS can reach out to end users with knowledge and technology. Abstracts of symposium presentations will be included in the proceedings; therefore, symposium organizers are responsible for ensuring all electronic title and abstract submissions.
